"6 teens who dared to change the world"

Excerpts from the June 1999 magazine and from the program booklet follow.


Kat began volunteering at age nine, serving hot lunches to the elderly through Meals on Wheels of Manatee, Florida. By age 14 she had moved on to fund-raising, and planned the World's Largest Easter Egg Hunt for Meals on Wheels. It was so big, it made the Guinness Book of World Records! At age 16, she founded the ManaTEEN club to promote youth volunteerism. Today, it's the largest, locally-based teen volunteer project in the country, with more than 8,000 members providing 500,000 hours of

community service annually in Southwest Florida. On average, Kat, 22, spends 20 hours a week promoting ManaTEEN, developing initiatives and new programs for the organization and doing hands-on volunteering. Additionally, Kat has been involved with the Easter Seal Society of Southwest Florida, AmeriCorps and the AIDS Council of Manatee. A true role model, she's currently attending a local community college and learning sign language to assist her local deaf service center. Kat also hopes to go to medical school and become a pediatrician.

## ATHRYN "KAT" MCKELL, RADENTON, FL

## THERE IS REALLY NOTHING MORE MPORTANT THAN HELPING OTHERS."

The inspiration: For as long as she can remember, Kat, 22, has been volunteering. She started at age nine, serving hot lunches to the elderly through Meals-on-Wheels. By the time Kat entered high school, she noticed that many of her friends had lots of free time on their hands. "I was so frustrated looking around my community and eeing all the problems that existed," ays Kat. "And then I realized that I go o school with all these kids who could e doing something to help out."

**The challenge:** In 1994, Kat, then , founded The ManaTeens, an orgatation to promote youth volunrism. She and a few friends launched club with a program called nTeen, in which more than 20 teens inteered their time to paint houses people in need. Then they began ng local volunteer agencies to see else they could help. Gradually aTeens were assigned to commutervice projects in 318 participating agencies around the county. "We try to put teens in places where they can help out and also learn valuable skills," says Kat.

**The results:** Today, ManaTeens' 8,000 members provide thousands of hours of service to more than 300 volunteer organizations in southwest Florida. This extraordinary commitment has helped show the community that teens *can* make a difference. "Many adult organizations don't realize how a teen can help," says Kat.

The future: Now a premed student at Manatee Community College in southern Florida, Kat still devotes 20 hours a week to her organization and is particularly excited about her latest project: a temporary shelter system for homeless women. She is also developing a core group of ManaTeens who can show other teens around the country how to start their own clubs.
